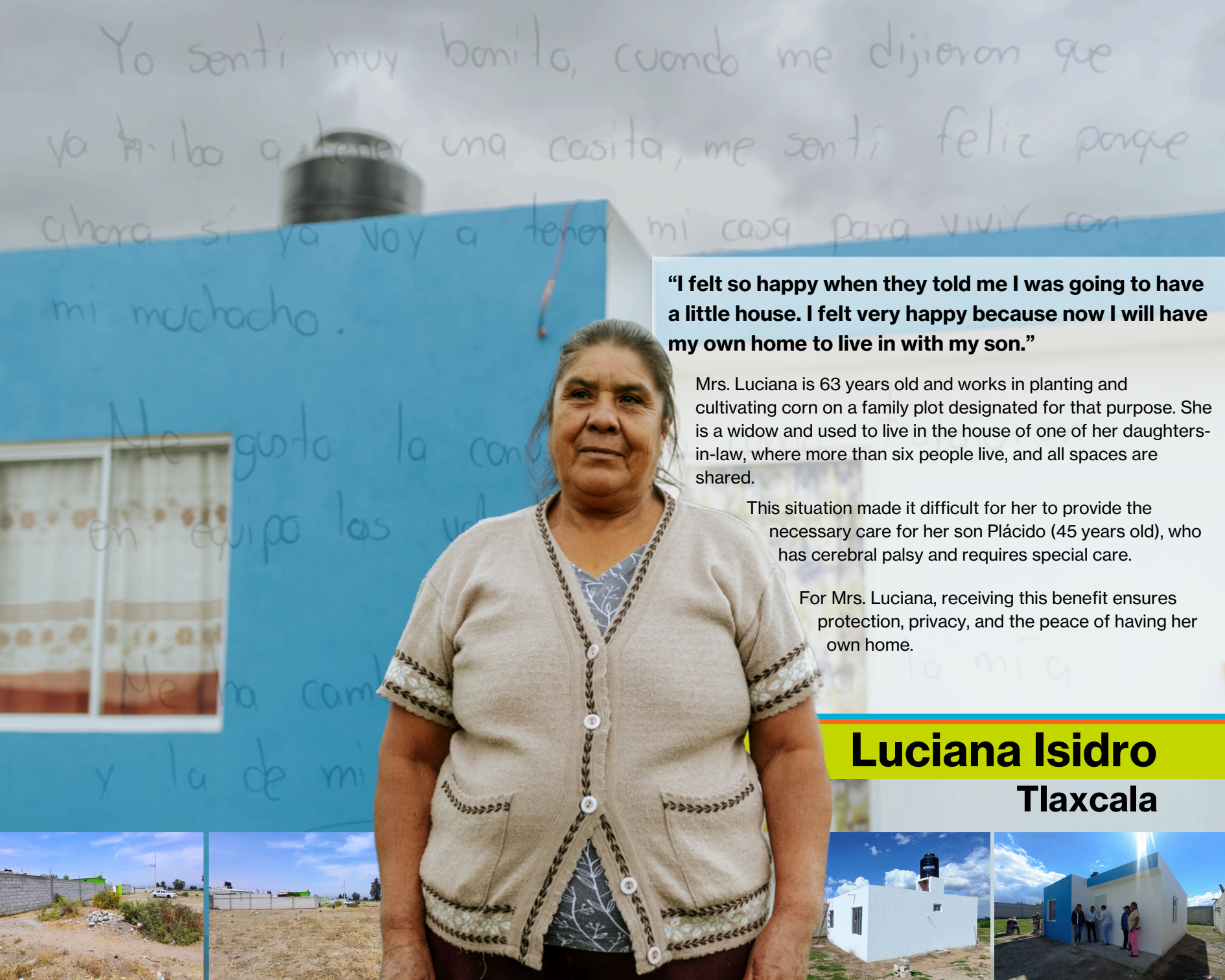

Housing Program

The human right to adequate housing, according to the UN's definition, is not limited to having a roof over one's head. It also includes access to basic infrastructure and a suitable location in relation to work, services, social facilities, transportation, and healthy environmental conditions.

Our commitment is to ensure that the right to housing is respected through seven key actions:



Legal Security of Tenure. This is a criterion for service provision in its various forms, including legal protection against eviction.



Availability of Infrastructure. Access to basic facilities and public spaces, as well as the adequate provision and frequency of services.



Habitability. Ensuring sufficient space relative to the number of occupants, structural safety, hygienic conditions, and protection from climatic factors.



Affordability. Housing costs should be sustainable and in line with the income levels of buyers, renters, or users.



Accessibility. Especially for those who, due to age, physical ability, or health status, require special conditions to meet their housing needs and ensure urban mobility.



Location. Housing should be in a safe and convenient place, with access to transportation, healthy environmental conditions, employment opportunities, and other means of livelihood.



Adequacy of Urban and Architectural Solutions. Including housing production processes and the use of materials, respecting cultural traits and local conditions.

Home Improvement Program



Improving a home allows for a greater degree of habitability, comfort, and safety for its residents.

There are various types of improvements, which may include structural interventions, expansions, finishes, or, in some cases, simply the provision of equipment or accessories.

The classification of improvements was designed to allow for better technical monitoring of the interventions carried out, as well as the collection of statistical data to identify the impact generated on families.

Social Inclusion and Poverty Reduction Program





Fundación Banorte and Habitat for Humanity Mexico promote social inclusion and poverty reduction in vulnerable communities, aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals of the 2030 Agenda. Their programs improve the quality of life for families affected by economic hardship, health issues, or natural disasters.

This project aims to strengthen social fabric and improve the quality of life for families in vulnerable situations.

Key Programs:

 **Adequate Housing:** Improves basic infrastructure in marginalized homes through repairs and new construction.

 **Productive Empowerment:** Supports economic activities of low-income families to foster self-sufficiency.

 **Early Childhood Development:** Promotes the physical, cognitive, and socio-emotional growth of children under six and pregnant women.

Impact and Reach

Since 2018, this partnership has benefited more than 2,000 families in Chiapas, Veracruz, Guerrero, Guanajuato, Chihuahua, and the State of Mexico, rebuilding homes and strengthening communities. In 2021, following the pandemic, strategies were redefined under the motto “We Build Strong Families”, focusing on housing, health, education, and productive development.

The actions are carried out over twelve months and include activities such as:

- Selection of beneficiaries, community diagnosis, and engagement
- Community organization and formation of work groups.
- Workshops on healthy housing and family finances
- Self-construction and home improvements
- Supervision and project closure

Construction of Homes with Improved Adobe

Adobe is the most commonly used construction material in rural human settlements across many communities in Mexico and represents an alternative to the demand for low-cost housing. Therefore, projects aimed at reinforcing the strength of this type of construction using thermal and environmentally friendly materials are of great importance.

This project provides the mezcal industry in the region with added value in its production chain by reducing pollution and waste from bagasse, contributing to the industry with elements of environmental and social responsibility. The homes are built with improved adobe, technically reinforced with the bagasse fiber from the maguey agave used in the production of distilled beverages, especially tequila and mezcal.



Water Allies

We aim to ensure water security in Chiapas through the rehabilitation and improvement of water and sanitation infrastructure, as well as the strengthening of local capacities with a focus on gender and sustainability.

The municipal seat of Arriaga (22,000 inhabitants) depends on the La Mica and Lagartero rivers, which reduce their flow by up to 30% during the dry season. Each year, an emergency plan is implemented to operate wells and distribute water via tank trucks, but it is insufficient. In La Gloria (1,900 inhabitants), the 40-meter-deep well has a pumping system at the end of its useful life and lacks protection, affecting service continuity.

This project improves water access through infrastructure and sustainable management strategies, involving authorities and communities.

Implemented Activities

Infrastructure:

- Maintenance of the drilled well in La Gloria
- Drilling of a 30-meter shallow well for public use
- Installation of pumping systems, discharge trains, and water pipelines in Arriaga and La Gloria
- Construction of protective works for the pumping systems
- Installation of automated chlorinators powered by solar energy

Management and Capacity Building:

- Community water management workshops with a watershed and financial self-management approach
- Training in leadership, conflict resolution, and water resource administration
- Technical roundtables for planning, supervision, and infrastructure execution
- Support in resource management at federal, state, and municipal levels

Guerrero state, Reconstruction: OTIS

On October 25, 2023, Hurricane Otis, a category 5 storm, severely impacted the port of Acapulco and surrounding areas in Guerrero, especially the coastal municipalities of Acapulco, Coyuca de Benítez, and San Marcos. These areas were already facing high vulnerability, marginalization, and poverty. The lack of preparedness at both the municipal and community levels became evident after the disaster.

The homes, built with precarious systems, suffered severe damage, mainly to their roofs, leaving many families in improvised shelters or dependent on relatives and friends. Habitat Mexico implemented a Housing Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Project in the region.

The objective was to reduce disaster vulnerability through participatory workshops to develop Community Risk Reduction and Contingency Plans, enabling an organized response to future natural events. These plans are managed and executed by the communities themselves, fostering the regeneration of the social fabric.

Additionally, a water pump will be repaired, and the drainage system improved as examples of effective community intervention.

WASH Project: Chihuahua

This project ensures access to safe water for 1,000 Rarámuri people in twenty localities of the municipality of Bocoyna, Chihuahua, through the construction of community systems for rainwater harvesting and storage. This will alleviate the water scarcity in these communities, where families – especially women and children – spend hours hauling water from distant wells, which is often contaminated and scarce during droughts.

Twenty community rainwater harvesting systems with a capacity of 20,000 liters each are being implemented, accompanied by a socio-educational process that includes workshops on water management, health, and hygiene. In addition, local committees will be trained to maintain the systems and manage water supply through tanker trucks during drought periods.

This project not only improves the health and quality of life of the communities but also strengthens their social cohesion and autonomy. Self-construction and management committees ensure the sustainability of the systems, empowering communities to manage their water resources and reduce their vulnerability to drought.

Building Dreams

In the La Montaña region of Guerrero, where extreme poverty, insecurity and lack of access to basic services define daily life, the Indigenous Children's School Homes represent a vital refuge for Mixtec, Tlapanec, and Nahua children and adolescents. Managed by the National Institute of Indigenous Peoples (INPI), these homes facilitate access to education by reducing dangerous school commutes from up to five hours to just a few minutes, protecting children from natural hazards and organized crime.

However, the facilities had serious structural deficiencies: water leaks, deteriorated bathrooms, lack of ventilation and damaged floors. The lack of infrastructure for water storage and heating exacerbated the hardships, directly affecting the health, hygiene, and well-being of the residents.

Paraje Montero (Malinaltepec):

Roof: Waterproofing of 980 m², installation of 56 meters of gutters, and a 10,000-liter cistern.

Bathrooms: Rehabilitation of showers, toilets, and sinks; installation of new partitions and fixtures.

Additional infrastructure: Roof and laundry area replacement, installation of solar heaters, and a 1 HP water pump.

Mixtecapa (San Luis Acatlán):

Rainwater harvesting: 82 meters of gutters, basic filter, and rehabilitated cistern with a new lid.

Bathrooms: Comprehensive maintenance of showers, toilets, sinks, and plumbing network.

General improvements: Roof waterproofing, rehabilitation of solar heaters, and painting of common areas.

El Tejocote (Malinaltepec):

Rainwater harvesting: 42 meters of gutters, filtration system, and 10,000-liter cistern.

Storage and distribution: Cleaning of cisterns, new pumps, replacement of fixtures, and installation of water level sensors.

Sanitation: Complete rehabilitation of sinks, toilets, and water network; maintenance of solar heaters and installation of new laundry areas.

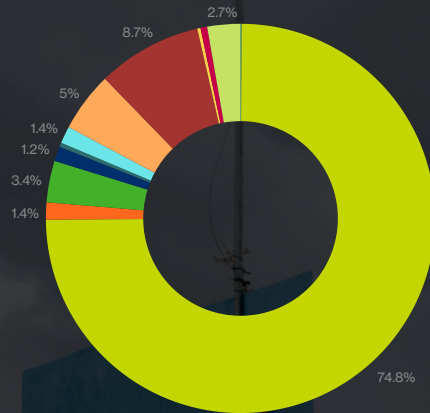

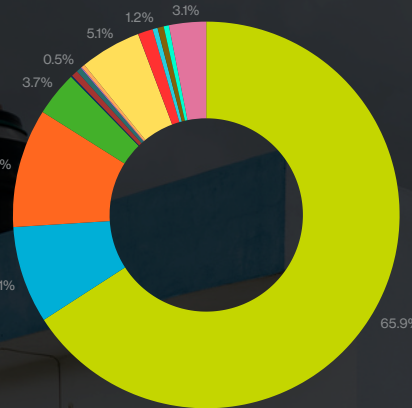

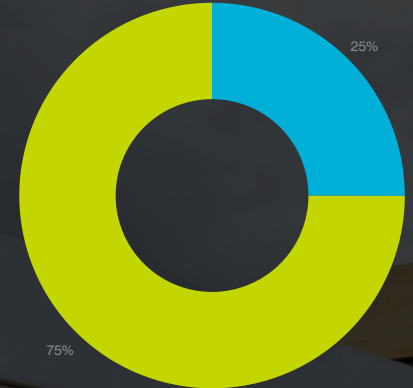
